## A Vote Against Student Smoking

The article entitled "Where Smoking Is An Elective," (April 4) describes the situation in at least three Long Island high schools in which student smoking is permitted in designated areas.

That this has come about seems amazing. For by now it is incontestable that smoking is an addiction; that it frequently leads to serious pathologies in nonsmokers who are compelled to inhale their neighbors' fumes as well as in smokers themselves; and that it is anomalous to allow smoking in school by teen-agers who may not legally purchase cigarettes. That some parents condone the smoking of their teen-aged progeny does not justify, much less require, high school administrators to set aside school space for smoking.

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
